First Fed Foundation is a private charitable corporation that began making grants in 2015, thanks to a generous gift valued at nearly \$12 million from the parent company of First Fed, when the bank was converted to a publicly traded company.

The Foundation is committed to supporting nonprofits, tribes, school districts, and government agencies that provide critical, timely assistance and build a brighter future for low- to moderate-income, disadvantaged, and/or marginalized persons and families in Clallam, Jefferson, Kitsap, and Whatcom Counties, and the city of Bellevue. Giving totals \$7,601,500 to date, and has been allocated to the following funding priorities:

\$2,800,000 to community development projects.

\$2,014,300 to organizations addressing homelessness and the availability of and access to affordable housing.

\$1,317,200 to organizations providing a wide array of critical, life-enhancing support to members of our communities.

\$1,250,000 to efforts that stimulate and support jobs and economic development.

\$220,000 to organizations that addressed hardships caused or exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic.

2025 Contributions

Housing & Homelessness Grants:

<u>Habitat for Humanity of East Jefferson County</u>: \$25,000 to build the infrastructure—including streets, sewer, and utility hook-ups—for the Landes South development, comprised of 14 units of permanently affordable housing for as many as 30 low-income Port Townsend residents.

<u>LifeWire</u>: \$25,000 to purchase and install a vehicle gate at the parking entrance to Hope Starts Here, a confidential shelter in Bellevue for individuals and families fleeing domestic violence, making it inaccessible to the public and safeguarding survivors.

Community Development Grants:

<u>City of Port Angeles Fire Department</u>: \$25,000 to equip 34 first responders with protective gear and trauma kits, enhancing responder safety so that they can provide life-saving care to victims in high-risk and violent emergencies.

<u>Forks Community Hospital</u>: \$25,000 to purchase new, up-to-date mammography equipment, enabling more women to receive breast cancer screening and diagnostics services closer to home.

<u>Port Angeles Food Bank</u>: \$25,000 to purchase a larger, refrigerated box truck to expand and enhance the Mobile Market's delivery of fresh and nutritious food directly to as many as 800 households per month.

Economic Development Grants:

<u>Peninsula College Foundation</u>: \$50,000 to help build the dental hygiene clinic and lab that, when completed, will facilitate hands-on training, graduate 10 licensed dental hygienists annually from Clallam and Jefferson Counties, address the healthcare workforce shortage, increase living-wage jobs, and add a low-cost dental clinic on the Olympic Peninsula.

<u>United Way of Clallam County</u>: \$25,000 to provide 800 students struggling with barriers to their education, access to financial aid, scholarships, and other educational attainment services and resources to ensuring they can obtain credentials, enter the workforce, and achieve financial security.

Community Support Grants:

<u>Foster Hearts</u>: \$5,000 to help provide extracurricular activities—including workshops, outdoor adventures, and educational outings—to 70 Whatcom County foster children, enhancing their emotional well-being, social skills, and resilience.

<u>Helpline House</u>: \$10,000 to support construction of a new 12,731 square foot community services and resource center on Bainbridge Island, doubling the current facility size in order to address rapidly escalating demand for food, emergency assistance, and mental health counseling.

<u>Key City Public Theatre</u>: \$5,000 to help bring Theatre Adventure Week to four Jefferson County classrooms, engaging hundreds of 1st-8th graders and their teachers in an arts program that incorporates and enhances existing curriculum by combining theatrical play and skill building, and culminates in student performances for schoolmates and parents.

<u>Kitsap Home Builders Foundation</u>: \$10,000 to support a workforce development program for 18-24-year-olds, which aims to train and prepare young adults for careers in construction, address an industrywide skills gap, boost employment opportunities, and enhance earning potential and economic mobility.

<u>Kitsap Homes of Compassion</u>: \$5,000 to establish the Resident Rental Assistance Fund, covering move-in costs and emergency rental assistance to help low-income residents secure and maintain stable, affordable housing.

<u>Kitsap Immigrant Assistance Center</u>: \$7,500 to provide housing financial assistance and navigation support to families at risk of eviction in Clallam, Jefferson, and Kitsap Counties.

<u>Kitsap Regional Library Foundation</u>: \$5,000 to support 'To the Library,' introducing all 3rd and 6th graders in Kitsap County Public Schools to the library through in-school visits and library field trips, connecting 5,000 students with all the resources and learning opportunities the library has to offer.

Max Higbee Center: \$5,000 to make necessary upgrades to the facility that serves more than 200 Whatcom County teens and adults living with developmental disabilities annually.

New Day Ministry: \$5,000 to provide nutritious, high-quality foods to more than 900 low-income individuals, seniors, children, and families in Kitsap County.

Northwest School of Wooden Boatbuilding: \$7,500 to develop curriculum that teaches new and seasoned marine technicians from Clallam, Jefferson, and Kitsap Counties how to work with rapidly changing battery technology and providing a pathway to living wage jobs in the maritime trades.

<u>Rebuilding Hope Sexual Assault</u>: \$7,500 to provide critical programs and services that address sexual violence in Kitsap County, serving approximately 300 survivors annually with 24/7 victim advocacy and therapy, and providing prevention education to hundreds more in the wider community.

<u>South Kitsap School District/West Sound STEM Network</u>: \$10,000 to deliver STEM Like ME! programs to 4,500 Clallam, Jefferson, and Kitsap County middle schoolers, connecting them with industry role models and hands-on STEM activities, and inspiring and creating future leaders.

<u>Whatcom Family & Community Network</u>: \$12,500 to help reduce suicide and promote mental well-being by providing trainings for middle and high school students, and workshops for adults and youth.

YEA Music: \$5,000 to support the sixth annual Summer Music Camps in Jefferson County, offered free of charge to more than fifty 4th through 12th graders.

2024 Contributions

Housing & Homelessness Grants:

<u>4PA</u>: \$25,000 to bring the electrical to code at the Touchstone Campus in Port Angeles, the future site of temporary housing with bathrooms, showers, laundry facilities, and recreation and kitchen areas, providing a safe place for 14 formerly homeless individuals to live, work, learn life-skills, develop community, and, with the support of a case worker, transition to self-sufficiency.

<u>Bellevue LifeSpring</u>: \$25,000 to provide one month of rent support to 10 low-income families, including approximately 25 children, helping them remain housed and avoid/prevent eviction.

<u>Lummi Nation Service Organization</u>: \$25,000 to fund the green elements including a water capturing/recycling system that feeds the on-site laundry facilities of the Lummi Nation's Eagle Haven Tiny Home Village in Whatcom County, comprised of 24 new one-bedroom units of permanent supportive housing for single and coupled individuals who struggle to be successfully housed.

<u>Olympic Housing Trust</u>: \$25,000 for construction of the Dundee Hill project, five permanently affordable, two- and three-bedroom townhomes that provide home ownership opportunities for first-time buyers earning between 50% - 80% AMI from Clallam and Jefferson Counties.

Olympic Peninsula Community Clinic: \$45,000 to fund the Homeless Medical Respite program, where unsheltered Clallam County community members can recover from acute medical conditions and receive ongoing care, support, and intensive case management.

<u>Peninsula Behavioral Health</u>: \$25,000 to support construction of 36 permanent, affordable, supportive housing units for chronically homeless individuals and families in Port Angeles.

<u>PorchLight</u>: \$25,000 to provide additional staffing, bedding, sleeping accommodations, nutritious meals, hygiene facilities, and supplies so that an additional 15 to 25 men from Bellevue can be sheltered during extreme weather this winter.

<u>Road2Home</u>: \$25,000 to hire an outreach coordinator who will recruit and train volunteers to provide chronically homeless adults in Whatcom County with resource navigation, care coordination, companionship, and a pathway to permanent shelter.

Community Development Grants:

Council of the Olympic Peninsula of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul: \$35,000 to provide emergency financial assistance to impoverished and vulnerable individuals, seniors, and families in Clallam, Jefferson, and Kitsap Counties to help avert utility shutoffs and eviction, address critical transportation needs, and minimize homelessness.

<u>Jefferson Healthcare Foundation</u>: \$25,000 for radiation oncology equipment which will provide an essential component of cancer treatment to as many as 300 Jefferson County patients each year, while mitigating the additional burden of traveling for treatment at a difficult and vulnerable time.

<u>Mariposa House</u>: \$25,000 to make critical repairs to the offices where staff deliver counseling services to victims of domestic violence and other crimes.

<u>North Olympic Healthcare Network</u>: \$25,000 for equipment needed to expand mobile health clinic services to include school-based, on-site preventative dental and vision services for Clallam County youth.

North Olympic Library System: \$25,000 to help construct a new Sequim Library, a free resource open to all community members, that will include ADA-accessible bathrooms, larger collections, improved access to broadband and computers, study and conference rooms for telehealth and remote work, and more space for educational, cultural, and civic events.

Economic Development Grants:

<u>Community Boat Project</u>: \$25,000 to support Shelter from the Storm, providing paid internships for local 18- to 24-year-olds to learn life skills and carpentry while building tiny houses for the homeless of Jefferson County.

<u>Nooksack Salmon Enhancement Association</u>: \$25,000 to support 40 entry-level, paid apprenticeships for Whatcom County college students in the environmental field to develop their career and benefit from networking and real-world work experience.

<u>Northwest Maritime Center</u>: \$25,000 to expand vocational programs for underserved Jefferson County youth, equipping them with essential skills and certifications and supporting them in achieving living-wage jobs.

OWL360: \$25,000 to fund Workforce Development and Education programs which engage over 235 Jefferson County young people annually, starting with career awareness for all 9th graders and culminating in paid work experiences and post-secondary educational opportunities.

<u>RE Sources</u>: \$25,000 to expand the Community Jobs Training Program to prepare 30 Whatcom homeless youth, single and low-income parents, veterans, disabled, recently incarcerated, and/or LGBTQ and BIPOC individuals to secure full-time living wage jobs with benefits, by providing individualized workforce and job seeker training, one-on-one mentoring, and coaching.

Community Support Grants:

<u>Bainbridge Youth Services</u>: \$7,000 to provide greater access to free, one-on-one professional mental health therapy to 250+ Kitsap County youth ages 13 to 21.

<u>Bellingham Public Schools Foundation</u>: \$7,500 to provide basic household furniture and supplies to more than 100 Bellingham families with young children as they transition out of homelessness and into more stable long-term housing.

<u>Bremerton Foodline</u>: \$10,000 to provide low-income women and children with the hygiene products they need and cannot afford to purchase.

<u>Cascade Connections</u>: \$5,000 to make an Interviewing Skills Workshop financially accessible for up to 40 jobseekers with disabilities, helping them navigate social, professional, and economic barriers related to employment.

<u>College Success Foundation</u>: \$5,000 to provide emergency grants to Clallam and Kitsap County high school students from low-income families and other high-need groups to help alleviate urgent financial hardships.

<u>Feiro Marine Life Center</u>: \$5,000 to provide hands-on watershed science education, both in the classroom and in the field, to over 400 fourth graders and their teachers from public and home schools in Port Angeles, Sequim, Crescent, Cape Flattery, and Quillayute.

<u>Ferndale Community Service Cooperative</u>: \$5,000 to purchase and provide emergency and basic hygiene supplies to approximately 450 low-income and house-less North Whatcom County neighbors.

<u>Financial Beginnings</u>: \$5,000 to underwrite a portion of the Financial Foundations program, providing Clallam, Kitsap, and Whatcom County youth and young adults with a free, detailed introduction to key financial concepts and resources.

<u>Jumping Mouse Children's Center</u>: \$6,000 to make the building and grounds wheelchair accessible, bringing a wider range of opportunities for expressive mental healthcare to disabled children in Jefferson County.

<u>Kidzz Helping Kidzz</u>: \$5,000 to support the youth-led collection of 4,000 pounds of food for distribution to more than 3,000 low-income Bremerton and South Kitsap youth.

North Cascades Institute: \$5,000 to support over 1,100 Whatcom County 5th and 6th graders, from more than 16 public schools, to participate in an immersive, three-day/two-night environmental education program in North Cascades Park.

North Olympic Foster Parent Association: \$5,000 to help fulfill the basic needs of more than 130 Clallam County foster kids by providing funding for clothing, school supplies, and extracurricular and enrichment activities.

<u>OurGEMS</u> (Our Girls Empowered through Mentoring and Service): \$5,000 to help provide a new laptop and headphones to 52 graduating youth from low- to moderate-income and underrepresented families in Bremerton, North Kitsap, Central Kitsap, South Kitsap, and Bainbridge Island school districts.

<u>Peacock Family Services</u>: \$12,000 to provide children from North Kitsap County with high-quality preschool and daycare programs, regardless of their family's income level.

<u>The Benji Project</u>: \$7,500 to deliver evidence-based mindfulness and self-compassion practices to as many as 500 Jefferson County students during the 2024-2025 school year, helping them improve their overall well-being, learn to cope with stress, anxiety, depression, and other challenges, and stay engaged in their education.

<u>Volunteer Hospice of Clallam County</u>: \$5,000 to purchase hospital beds and mattresses which, along with a range of medical equipment, are loaned for as long as needed and at no charge to hospice patients and the community from Lending Closets in Port Angeles and Sequim.

<u>Whatcom Dispute Resolution Center</u>: \$10,000 to support the Housing Stability Program, which reduces evictions and averts homelessness by providing free mediation services to tenants and landlords.

Whatcom Family YMCA: \$5,000 to furnish a new teen center and intergenerational space on the main floor of the downtown Bellingham YMCA, making it a bright, vibrant, and engaging gathering place for youth and seniors.

<u>Winter Welcoming Center</u>: \$5,000 to help fund the Winter Welcoming Center, a frontline outreach that offers a warm and hospitable space seven mornings a week, holidays included, during the cold months of the year, for those in Jefferson County in need of shelter.

2023 Contributions

Housing & Homelessness Grants Awarded:

<u>Habitat for Humanity in Whatcom County</u>: \$50,000 to fund construction of the first eight townhomes in Mateo Meadows, a 3.48-acre, 30-townhome, mixed-income community in Everson, building a pathway to homeownership for eligible families with approximately 32 parents and kids, earning between 30% AMI - 130% AMI.

<u>Housing Connector</u>: \$25,000 to expand tech-for-good housing solutions to Bellevue, Washington, increasing access to affordable, dignified private-market homes, making permanent housing available to those who are housing unstable or experiencing homelessness.

<u>Kitsap Legal Services</u>: \$25,000 for additional attorney representation and support staff to provide free legal assistance and representation to low-income tenants at risk of losing their housing.

<u>Lydia Place</u>: \$33,000 to expand the capacity to meet the growing need for housing case management services for individuals and families fleeing domestic violence in Whatcom County.

<u>Serenity House of Clallam County</u>: \$30,000 to purchase a vehicle for the West End Housing Resource Center, giving the Forks-based Coordinated Entry housing specialist greater outreach

capabilities to further parts of the West End, and the ability to serve more of Clallam County's low-income and homeless population.

<u>YWCA Bellingham</u>: \$50,000 to purchase and rehabilitate the Garden Street Apartments, providing 11 permanent, affordable housing units and intensive case management services, intended to break the cycle of homelessness and poverty for chronically homeless women with mental, physical and/or behavioral health disabilities.

Community Development Grants Awarded:

Bellevue Schools Foundation: \$25,000 to provide tuition assistance for 25-35 low-income and/or homeless students, ages 3-5, to attend preschool for a full school day or extended workday.

<u>Bellingham Food Bank</u>: \$25,000 to provide people who are menstruating with the period support products they need and cannot afford to purchase.

Boys & Girls Clubs of the Olympic Peninsula: \$25,000 to increase participation and enhance academic, leadership, and career readiness programs for Clallam County tweens and teens during a critical stage in their development.

<u>Camp Beausite Northwest</u>: \$25,000 to create and deliver four new weekend programs that provide opportunities for social, behavioral, educational, and life skills development for 96 people with special needs from Clallam, Jefferson, and Kitsap Counties.

<u>Forks Community Food Bank</u>: \$25,000 to support the food bank in providing milk, eggs, butter, and bread to the more than 16,000 families, children, and elderly clients annually.

<u>Olympic Medical Center Foundation</u>: \$35,000 to provide more low-income patients undergoing cancer treatment with support for rent, utilities, medication, transportation, lodging, and other essentials.

Olympic Peninsula YMCA: \$25,000 to purchase an outdoor, walk-in cooler to store perishable food used to provide nearly 3,000 food boxes to as many as 175 food-insecure East Jefferson County families during spring, summer, and winter non-school days.

<u>Port Angeles Food Bank</u>: \$25,000 to increase the quality and variety of food included in Friday Food Bags, which provide food to 300+ Port Angeles School District students every weekend during the school year.

Economic Development Grants Awarded:

<u>Center for Sustainable Infrastructure</u>: \$30,000 to support the development of an inclusive, community-driven vision and strategy for establishing a Natural Resource Innovation Center that

drives the creation of jobs, particularly those paying a "prosperity wage" of \$26+ per hour for 25-54-year-olds in Clallam and Jefferson Counties; and resulting in a Roadmap that strongly positions the Natural Resource Innovation Cluster to submit compelling, well-considered requests for implementation funding from the private sector as well as state and federal programs.

Community Support Grants Awarded:

<u>Bainbridge Artisan Resource Network</u>: \$5,000 to support the free monthly Teen Night program, which offers confidence-building, creative, and social opportunities for 60 to 80 youth throughout the 2023-2024 school year.

<u>Captain Joseph House Foundation</u>: \$10,000 to support 15 Gold Star immediate family members --including surviving spouses, parents, and children of fallen service members from all branches of the military-- from Clallam, Jefferson, Kitsap County, and Whatcom Counties, to receive six days of respite and support, strengthening bonds, creating new memories, and connecting with others experiencing similar loss.

<u>Cares of Washington</u>: \$7,500 to fund Community Inclusion and Employment Services for ten new clients to become involved in their communities, develop relevant work skills, secure employment, and build financial and personal independence and self-sufficiency.

<u>Catholic Community Services of Western Washington</u>: \$5,000 to provide safe home access to 10 to 20 low- and fixed-income seniors in Clallam, Jefferson, and Kitsap Counties by funding the purchase of materials to construct ramps, rails, and grab bars, installed at no cost at their residences by a team of retired engineers.

<u>Clallam Mosaic</u>: \$12,000 to renovate and upgrade Clallam Mosaic's new, permanent home with an ADA-compliant bathroom and front door, making programs accessible for those living with intellectual and developmental disabilities and mobility issues.

<u>Dove House Advocacy Services</u>: \$7,500 to support the Emergency Food & Supplies Project, providing basic necessities to Jefferson County victims of crime and abuse who are in recovery and/or experiencing crisis, so they can focus on healing and rebuilding healthy, hopeful, and self-sufficient lives.

East Jefferson County Conference of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul: \$7,500 to respond to the emergency needs of individuals and families who have nowhere else to turn, helping them meet their most basic needs and providing support that can help them keep their homes and jobs, and avoid homelessness.

<u>Ginger's Closet & Disaster Relief</u>: \$15,000 to provide individuals and families in Forks who are experiening disaster and crisis with emergency financial aid, and make repairs and upgrades to the new, donated facility so that it is safe and accessible for use by Forks' residents.

Helen Haller Elementary School: \$5,000 to help fund the Books for Summer reading program, which provides six self-selected books at no cost to all 500 students, helping to prevent the academic skills slide which commonly occurs during summer break and close the achievement gap for students in families who are experiencing economic hardship.

<u>Jefferson County Immigration Rights Advocates</u> (JCIRA): \$5,000 to provide low-income Clallam and Jefferson County immigrant individuals and families, many of whom live in severe poverty and work only seasonal jobs, with financial help for food, rent assistance, car repair, medical bills, and more.

<u>Juan de Fuca Foundation for the Arts</u>: \$5,000 to support Music in the Schools in March 2024, connecting 2,000 K through 12 students, their parents, and teachers from school districts in Clallam and Jefferson Counties with workshops, performances, and outreach from national touring artists, free of charge.

<u>Kathleen Sutton Fund</u>: \$5,000 to support women living in Clallam, Jefferson, and Kitsap Counties with the transportation costs incurred in their treatment for cancer.

<u>Kitsap Cancer Services</u>: \$7,500 to provide 20 patients undergoing cancer treatment with grants for transportation, medications and medical specialty items, copays, pre-treatment emergency dental care, groceries, rent, utilities, and other basic needs.

<u>Kitsap Immigrant Assistance Center</u>: \$5,000 to support the Emergency Assistance Fund, providing rent and food assistance to immigrant families unable to access other assistance options.

<u>Max Higbee Center</u>: \$5,000 to increase Weekday Program staff in order to provide a higher level of support and care to the current 146 participants who are living with developmental disabilities in Whatcom County.

<u>Morningside</u>: \$10,000 to support the growth and expansion of the Pre-Employment Transition Services for high school students with disabilities in Clallam and Jefferson Counties, helping them identify and prepare to achieve their employment goals and make a more successful and seamless transition into adulthood.

National Alliance on Mental Illness of Whatcom County: \$5,000 to underwrite a portion of a bilingual Community Outreach Specialist in engaging members of the Latinx community in taking part in no-cost mental wellness initiatives.

Operation Homefront Inc.: \$5,000 to support the Back-to-School Brigade, providing backpacks and school supplies to 350 military children in Kitsap County.

<u>Port Townsend Marine Science Center</u>: \$5,000 to support more than 200 low- and middle-income K-12 students from Clallam, Jefferson, and Kitsap Counties, who face significant educational and emotional challenges, to participate in science education, increasing learning

opportunities, improving science literacy, and inspiring careers in science and an ethic of stewardship.

<u>Wild Bird Charity</u>: \$10,000 to cover the cost of providing 3,000 of the 25,000 weekend bags of food --each one containing six meals and snacks-- for distribution to 750+ Whatcom County kids experiencing food insecurity during the 2023-2024 school year.

<u>YMCA Pierce and Kitsap Counties</u>: \$5,000 to support the YMCA's swim program, which provides free transportation and swim lessons to all 600+ third grade students in the Bremerton School District.

2022 Contributions

Housing & Homelessness Grants Awarded:

<u>Clallam-Jefferson Pro Bono Lawyers</u>: \$25,000 to provide legal advice and representation to low-income Clallam and Jefferson County renters who are at risk of losing their housing and having an eviction on their record, making it nearly impossible to find safe, affordable housing in the future.

<u>Eastside Legal Assistance Program</u>: \$25,000 to provide legal services to 60 individuals facing civil legal problems that impact the stability of their housing in Bellevue in 2023.

<u>Housing Resources Bainbridge</u>: \$50,000 to support 31 households with approximately 65 individuals to become owners of new, permanently affordable homes located on Bainbridge Island, near shopping, schools and parks.

<u>Kulshan Community Land Trust</u>: \$30,000 to provide the support necessary for approximately 15 low- to moderate-income households in Whatcom County to purchase affordable homes of their own in 2023-2024.

Mercy Housing Northwest: \$100,000 to fund construction of Millworks Family Housing & Early Learning Center, 83 units of permanently affordable family housing and a 6-classroom early learning center in Bellingham's downtown waterfront.

Road2Home: \$25,000 to provide six months of funding for the Allyship Program, assisting those living on the streets in Bellingham with navigating social services, developing sustainable life skills, and providing support for healthcare, transportation and emergencies.

<u>Scarlet Road</u>: \$25,000 to house 12 or more victims of sex trafficking and their dependents in Kitsap County in 2023 with a flexible rental assistance program, while supporting long-term stability through wraparound case management.

Community Development Grants Awarded:

<u>Bainbridge Island Child Care Centers</u>: \$25,000 to fund capital improvements, allowing the Center to continue its programs at its current rates in a safe and secure facility.

Boys & Girls Clubs of Whatcom County: \$25,000 to purchase the childcare facility and surrounding property on Yew Street in Bellingham, ensuring the expansion of affordable, quality childcare services.

<u>Clallam County Fire Protection District No. 4</u>: \$25,000 to fully fund the purchase of a gurney with a battery-operated lift capability, decreasing the risk of injury to volunteers and patients.

North Olympic Healthcare Network: \$25,000 to support the renovation of the new Eastside Health Clinic, which provides community members, regardless of ability to pay, with full-spectrum primary care, behavioral health services and nurse care management, expanded COVID testing/vaccination and telehealth capacity, and eye care services.

Community Support Grants Awarded:

<u>Assistance League of Bellingham</u>: \$5,000 to support Operation School Bell, with the goal of improving confidence and encouraging school attendance by providing low-income and homeless students from seven Whatcom County school districts and The Lummi Nation with new clothing and shoes, so they can focus on school and not their need for basic clothing.

<u>College Success Foundation</u>: \$5,000 to provide emergency funding to low-income students in Port Angeles and Bremerton, helping to stabilize their families and supporting them to stay on track in school.

<u>Communities In Schools of Whatcom-Skagit</u>: \$7,500 to provide clothing, school supplies, personal care items, learning resources, counseling support and more to 4,000+ students of five middle and high schools in the Bellingham and Ferndale school districts.

<u>Feiro Marine Life Center</u>: \$5,000 to support a place-based, hands-on experiential education program for approximately 400 students from 18 fourth grade public, homeschool, and alternative classes from Crescent, Port Angeles, and Sequim districts.

Financial Beginnings Washington: \$5,000 to fund the delivery of the free Financial Foundations program to 1,000 youth and young adults in Clallam, Kitsap, and Whatcom Counties, providing detailed information on key financial concepts and resources intended to increase financial literacy, stability, and independence.

Foster Hearts: \$5,000 to provide 100 children in foster care in Whatcom County with funding for sports fees, athletic equipment, classes/lessons, school field trips, GED fees, high school graduation expenses, and more, so that they're able to participate in extracurricular activities during the 2022-2023 school year.
